

Safeguarding update:

### **Diversity week –**

Ann Foxley-Johnson delivered assemblies for FS2/KS1 and KS2 on equality then workshops for KS2 classes on challenging stereotypes, racist and homophobic language.

Classes took part in activities throughout the week on different age related topics – celebrating differences, gender, sexuality and socio-economic status.

Key stage assemblies for parents to share class work. Children's voice helping to challenge adults prejudices.

New house captain voting – gender neutral not one boy one girl but top two voted.

### **NSPCC Stay Safe and Speak Out programme –**
